

MARILYN BERGER is Professor at Seattle University School of Law. She has a B.S. from Cornell University and a J.D. from the University of California at Berkeley. She practiced law as a Legal Aid Attorney in New York and California. She has been a visiting professor in London, Kyoto Japan, summer visitor at Washington University School of Law in St. Louis; and a U.S. State Dept. grantee in St. Petersburg Law School, Russia.

Her approach to law is highly interdisciplinary. She founded the Films for Justice Institute at Seattle University Law School. Through the Institute, Professor Berger produced three educational documentary films in the series, Lessons from Woburn based on the lawsuit, Anderson v. W.R. Grace, the book by Jonathan Harr, A CIVIL ACTION, and the Hollywood movie by the same name. She directs the Trial Advocacy Program, which uses storytelling to teach courtroom procedure. Her Film and the Law seminar employ art, film, literature and poetry to present issues of law, ethics, and social justice. She co-authored (with John Mitchell & Ron Clark): Pretrial Advocacy: Planning, Analysis & Strategy; and Trial Advocacy: Planning, Analysis & Strategy (Aspen).

Berger is presently co-producing a documentary film for general audiences and for law schools, Out of the Ashes: 9-11 with Emmy-award winning filmmaker, Sarah Holt.
